Happenings this summer

Pioneer Square (Old Burying Ground) Planning Project

A very successful, well-attended Open House was held at Christ Church Cathedral on June 21. A number of display panels explained the history of Pioneer Square and the issues needing attention and improvement. Through this open house; public consultation sessions in the square on June 23 and 29; and an online version, about 300 respondents completed a questionnaire. The Advisory Group is studying the results of the survey. The next step is to draft a management plan reflective of the Advisory Group conversations and the open house results. It is hoped to meet again in early October to discuss the first draft. A second open house is planned for later. Two reports have been completed: a

"Stone Conservation Report" by Ken Johnson, and a "Tree Resource" report by Talbot Mackenzie and Associates describing trees in the square. The City of Victoria website has a page for the Pioneer Square planning project:

Obon Ceremony and Festival

On Sunday 31 July the annual **Obon Ceremony** (traditional Japanese Buddhist ceremony for the dead) was conducted at the Kakehashi monument in the southwest corner of the cemetery. A large group of volunteers from OCS and the Victoria Nikkei Cultural Society (VCNS) gathered at noon and washed many markers, and placed bouquets of flowers prior to the ceremony at 2:00 lead by Rev. Grant Ikuta. He paid special attention to the children attending and explained the importance of honouring the dead in a very entertaining way.

The ceremony was followed by a tour of some of the 150 Japanese gravesites by John Adams who in engaging fashion told the stories of those interred.

After the tour we were treated to displays of traditional *taiko* drumming, dancers in costume, watermelon smashing (only for the children unfortunately) and tables laden with tasty and exotic Japanese food. Recording and Summer Student

Our Summer Student Program for 2011 has come to an end. This year our goal was to complete the recording of section T. Jane Bruch and Don Reksten started off in May by hiring <u>Cailin Bain-Glenn</u> to work as chief recorder. The process is rather straight forward but requires a lot of time and diligence. Jane first checked our office records to see if any of the monuments in the section have been done. Then each row is walked and listed to outline where there are markers and where there are no markers. Photos are then taken of each marker, placed on a CD and given to the recorder. This process allows much of the drawing to be done in the office or at home rather than in the cemetery where the weather can be a factor. Once a recording sheet for each marker is finished, measurements are taken and a check of all wording on the monument is done in the cemetery. We are pleased to have succeeded in completing section T as planned and want to thank Cailin for his hard work and dedication to the project. **Well done Cailin!**

Row Marker Project

Last month we were able to place 20 more row markers. These new markers are in the third and final belt. We started at Memorial Crescent in Section Q, plot # 57 and section K plot # 1 and worked our way east. We need 18 more markers to complete this first phase of our project.

An Interesting Find Wilf Bruch

While doing some cleaning of monuments in the lower part of section F at Ross Bay Cemetery we came across a curbing sunk in the ground with only a small portion visible. It just looked different so we struck it with a shovel and found to our amazement that it was actually cast iron and not concrete as originally thought. Being of a curious nature we soon had it dug

up and removed from the cemetery for cleaning. After a lot of grinding and brushing it was given a few coats of paint and returned to the cemetery. It now sits proudly as it should, ten inches above the ground. It is the only example of a single cast iron curbing at Ross Bay Cemetery and we are truly proud of our new find. It makes you wonder what else is just under the grass waiting to be found.





New Stories in Stone Editor

We are on our way! We anticipate a fall publication of the Old Cemeteries journal publication *Stories in Stone*. Our new editor, S. Fern Perkins, has assumed the leadership of the task at hand. You will remember her as "Isabella Ross" at many of our Ross Bay tours and other events where period costumes are *de rigueur*. She is a teacher and university instructor. She is the great-great-granddaughter of Charles and Isabella Ross, first Métis family of Fort Victoria in 1843. Charles was the HBC Chief Trader who supervised the building of Fort Victoria from 1843-44 until his death. Ross Bay is named after Isabella, the first registered woman landowner in British Columbia. Searching for Emily in Ross Bay Cemetery Diana Pedersen

In *Searching for Emily*, an entertaining new 94-minute documentary feature film directed by Kristina Campbell, portrait artist Manon Elder, in collaboration with Royal BC Museum Curator Kathryn Bridge, sets out to redefine the image of Emily Carr by exploring her life and work as a young artist. In the film, Elder visits the BC Archives, the Royal BC Museum, the James Bay Inn (where Carr died), Gwai Haanas, and—in a two-minute segment—the Ross Bay Cemetery. After briefly getting lost in the cemetery, Elder visits Carr's grave to pay homage on Carr's birthday, December 13th. The DVD of this film can be borrowed from the Greater Victoria Public Library.
